



### **RE Year 7 End Points-** Concepts and introduction to Abrahamic religions

In year 7, students study the three Western Abrahamic religions including the continuity and changes between them as they emerge in time. They also consider big life questions.







## RE Year 8 End Points- Eastern religions, division, atheism and practices

### RE Year 9 End Points- Developing deeper thought and ability to question the world around us.

In year 9, students analyse the impact of Christo-Islamic thought on everyday life. They question the relationship between religion and science, whilst analysing the role of morality and religion in making moral decisions. They are given time to reflect and discuss the deep questions; Are we animals or humans? Is God real? Student also explore the impact of religion on human rights and how human rights are experienced in the modern world.

# Evil and Suffering

- To reflect upon and consider the nature of evil, what is means, and why it might exist.
- To explore and evaluate religious and secular explanations for the origins of evil.
- To consider the problem that the existence of evil and suffering causes Christians and Muslims.
- To evaluate Christian philosophers' responses to evil and suffering.
- To consider case studies of evil and suffering and apply and evaluate both religious and secular explanatrions to these.
- To consider the story of Job to understand Christian beliefs about evil and suffering.
- Personally consider and evaluate the problem of evil and suffering.

# Faith and Ethics

- To explain the concept of a moral dilemma. To introduce how religious ideas may shape a person's response to these dilemmas.
- To consider and understand religious and non-religious ethical theories and how they might be used to approach moral dilemmas.
- To consider some of the issues surrounding genetic engineering and apply ethical theories.
- To explore and evaluate some of the claims of transhumanism.
- To debate some of the issues surrounding abortion and to apply ethical theories to case studies.
- To consider the idea of sanctity of life and consider how it effects Christian and Muslim opinions about abortion and the death penalty.
- To describe abortion in the UK law and consider how this has developed over time.
- To consider Christian/Muslim arguments for and against the death penalty.
- To explore and consider the case of Derek Bentley.

# Religion and Science

- Understand the difference between creationists and evolutionists.
- To debate whether humans are unique or not, in comparison with other animals.
- To compare the Christian creation order of creation with scientific explanations.
- To explain the concept of evolution and consider the case of Homo Naledi.
- To consider whether the concept of life after death is unique to humans.
- To explore religious and nonreligious arguments relating to religious experiences.
- To personally reflect upon and consider the relationship between science and religion.

## Human Rights

JULY

- To explore the origins of our concept of human rights.
- To consider and evaluate the importance of different human rights through case studies.
- To understand the role of bias in the right to a fair trial.
- To evaluate arguments relating to the use of torture.
- To explore the different ways in which our right to privacy is threatened and its importance in relation to other human rights.
- To consider the right to freedom of religion through a case study.
- To consider and evaluate whether animals should be afforded rights.
